

Letter from our minister

In the run up to Christmas, are you one of those people who has it all under control? The sort of person who buys next year's cards in the New Year sales, who has everything bought, wrapped, labelled and ready to be given out at the beginning of December. Or, are you someone who runs around in circles like Corporal Jones, in Dad's Army, shouting 'Don't panic, don't panic'?

The truth is that most of us are somewhere in-between the two extremes.

Whether it be the Christmas festivities, the challenge of Brexit, or the General election, our response to such events reflects who we are and some of our deepest felt thoughts



Dare we imagine God's attitude and approach to the world before the first Christmas? Was there a willingness to embrace, get involved, to be immersed in the human experience? Or was there a judgemental separation, a giving up and a limiting of how love is shown and shared to the world?

From the start of time, the story of God's approach to the world is one of involvement, openness and countless expressions of patient, passionate love towards all people; and the clearest expression of this is in the person of Jesus.

In the birth story of Jesus and throughout his life, not everything is neat, sorted and under control. An unplanned pregnancy, a birth in a faraway place at the whim of the political powers of the day, the presence of soldiers on every street corner to keep order, the need to flee the infanticide and the life of the refugee for the young family, is enough to make anyone feel out of their depth. Certainly it was far from an ordered, secure start to life. But one which sadly reflects everyday living for many in the world then and now.

In his life and ministry, Jesus had to be alert to the threats of those in authority as he challenged injustices and the established ways of thinking about God, which ultimately led to the cross. A far from ordered and organised life, but also a far from panicked one. Rather a life of trust in the ways of God, a life waiting on God's leading in prayer and silence, a life of active love and engagement especially among those on the margins.

So, whether you are organised, or feel anxious about all that needs doing, the Jesus way is one of embracing what life throws at us, in the context of God's embrace of love, in which we learn to trust, to share and to hope in the mystery of the transforming kingdom let loose in the world.

Holy Habit 7 - Eating Together

Getting our teeth into it!

"They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts." (Acts 2:46)

Over the winter we are focusing on the 7th of the 10 Holy Habits we are exploring – Eating Together! "What?" I hear you say, "is that really a holy habit? At least that's one of the 10 that I'm good at!"

The coming weeks provide plenty of opportunities to eat together at church. We have breakfast at 10.00am on the first Sunday of every month, and on 12 January we have the annual covenant service, followed by lunch together. Mark that in your diary!

But the emphasis of Acts 2:46 is on the home. As they say, the family that eats together stays together, and friends and neighbours can be invited on occasion to share in a meal too. Eating Together doesn't have to be pre-arranged, 'best cutlery' occasions! As we all know, even a cuppa and a biscuit can be a precious time of sharing with one another.

There are 10 occasions in Luke alone when Jesus is seen sharing a meal. We shall

probably look at several of these during services over the coming weeks, and in the weekly emails. It's interesting to note that most of the meals were in someone else's house, or picnics on the hillside or on the beach. Sometimes Jesus ate with close friends, like Martha and Mary, in Luke 10: 38 - 42. In Luke 7: 36 - 50 we see Jesus invited by one of his critics – Simon the Pharisee, one of the religious leaders, and In Luke 19: 1 - 10, we see him inviting himself to stay at the house of the chief tax collector in Jericho.

We probably think first of being the hosts, at home or at church, and that's great. But Jesus sets the example of being guests in someone else's house. How do we handle such situations when they arise? We probably take a small gift and are appreciative of all we are offered. How can we use occasions when we are the guests to spread the love of Jesus? Let's hope we all get lots of opportunities over the Christmas season! Holy Habits Team

Japan

In October I had the great privilege of attending some of the Rugby World Cup matches in Japan. I have previously been to World Cup matches in this country and in France, but this was a whole new ball game. I've never been further east than Turkey before, so I had some trepidation about what to expect.

It began badly when I arrived at Fukuoka Airport on the southern island of Kyushu, but my luggage didn't. I checked in at the hotel, then I had

to find somewhere to buy some clothes. I could only find an H&M, so I was much trendier than usual. I didn't need any toiletries, as hotel bathrooms in Japan come with everything you could need plus things you don't. In the former category were toothpaste and a toothbrush. In the latter category were all sorts of buttons on the toilet which squirted water at you from different angles. More details are inappropriate in a church magazine.

Things improved the next day when my luggage arrived, and I joined a queue at the train station for my rail pass. The people in front of me were Welsh, and to my surprise two of them were from Trebanos, the small village in the Swansea Valley where my mother lived. Not only did we know lots of people in common, they happened to be the parents of Justin Tipuric, one of the stars of the Welsh rugby team. I didn't get to meet him, but I did meet George North later on. He was huge, but very nice!

I stayed on the island of Kyushu most of the time, 700 miles away from the typhoon that struck Tokyo. There was an earthquake elsewhere on the island, an active volcano pouring out steam that I went especially to visit as my son Jonathan is a geologist and I brought him some pumice stone. There were also lots of tsunami warnings in every seaside town, but I never felt unsafe, wherever I went. However, it is a fallacy that Japanese trains, buses and coaches are always on time. That may apply to the bullet trains, but it did not apply to the trains I could afford!

The main reason I always felt safe was that the Japanese people were welcoming, helpful, charming, courteous, and brilliant at queuing! I grew up with tales of the River Kwai, Tenko and awful prisoner-of-war camps, but the current generation of Japanese people are the kindest, most pleasant people of any country I have ever been to. If somebody drops something in the street,

Is it still raining?

"Is it still raining?" is a question that will have been asked in many Sheffield homes this autumn. When we consider the heartache caused by flooding to whole villages only a few miles away we realise how fortunate most of us have been. You will probably be aware that Sheffield's rainfall this autumn had already surpassed that of Sheffield's worst previous autumn with a full two weeks still to go.

However, as you stare out of the window at the rain, you might want to count your blessings that you don't live in Mawsynram, India where the average annual rainfall is nearly 12 metres. Can you imagine what it must be like living in a place where the seasonal rainfall is seven times worse than what we've had in Sheffield every season year in year out! Or how about living in Cherrapunji, India, which in its wettest year, had nearly 26.5 metres of rain in one year!

Then imagine what it would be like to have 136 successive years of rainfall as bad as Cherrapunji! And that is assuming that none of the water was lost to evaporation! That is what it would have taken for Mount Ararat in Turkey to have been almost submerged in flooding (thought to have been the landing place of Noah's ark).

Or if it had only rained for 40 days that would have needed an average of 90 metres of rain a day! Derek North
